

# Wet on Wet Workshop

## Information sheet

### Materials:

- Paper (computer paper or recycled paper, not too thick)
- A jug or pot of tea that has cooled
- Small flat leaves (even weeds will work!)
- Food dye or watercolour paint

### Equipment:

- A plastic cloth or sheet to protect your workspace and your drying space
- A tub or tray that is bigger than your paper (for example, a recycled meat tray, a plastic tub or the lid from a plastic tub)
- A cheap paintbrush, old pastry brush or similar (it's likely to become stained)
- One or two small containers (recycled yoghurt containers work well)

### Optional items:

- Plastic gloves (to protect your hands from staining)
- Items that have texture (for example, some hessian or an A4 plastic sleeve with binder holes)
- Rectangular cooling racks from your kitchen
- An old toothbrush
- A small spray bottle (better if you are working outdoors)
