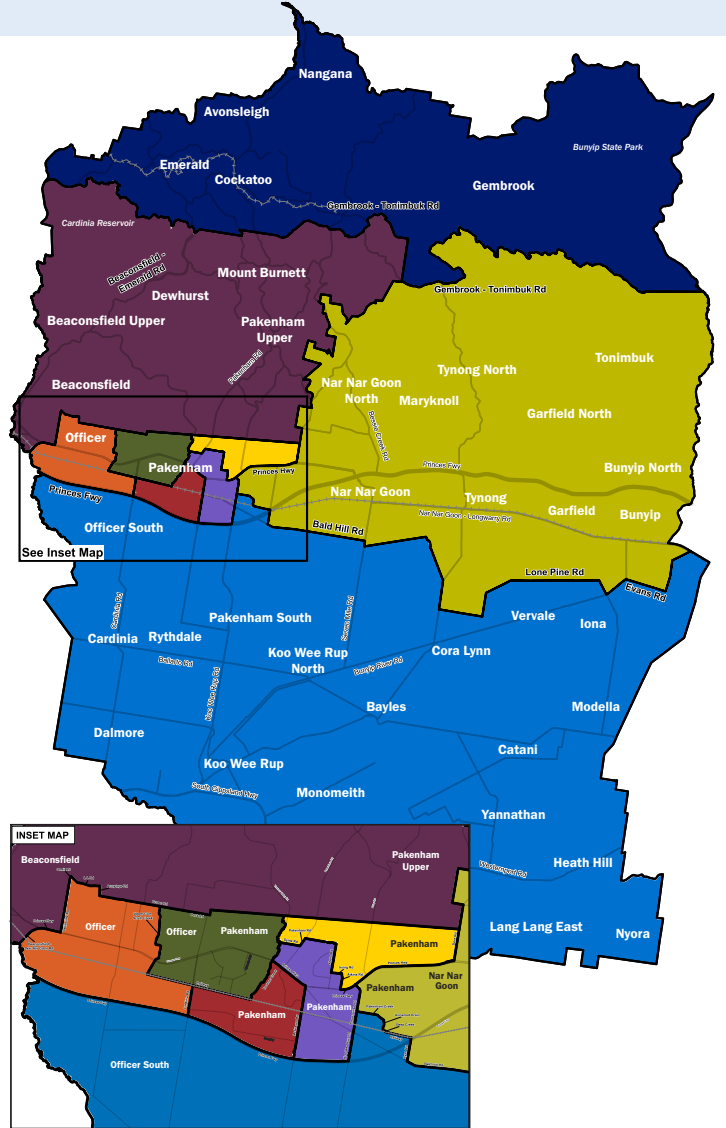

Citizen of the Year

Robb Evans

Robb has been recognised for his extraordinary efforts in building nationwide support for families navigating the devastating impacts of eating disorders.

Transforming unimaginable personal loss into a powerful movement for change, Robb established Liv's Legacy to honour his daughter, Olivia, who passed away at 15 from anorexia nervosa. Robb has now dedicated himself to improving support, treatment and awareness for young people and families impacted by eating disorders.

Robb's impact has been far-reaching, helping secure more than \$56 million in funding for eating disorder research and treatment programs, including hospital in the home services and therapy dog initiatives at Alfred Health and Monash Children's Hospital.

Senior Citizen of the Year

Maureen Timms

Maureen Timms has been recognised for her unwavering service to the community and compassion for people who are living through their most vulnerable moments.

A dedicated volunteer with Palliative Care South East since 2012, Maureen has contributed more than 150 hours through their companionship program.

Known for going above and beyond, Maureen's empathy and reliability have made her a vital pillar for families and care teams alike.

Maureen is known for regularly taking on extra clients in times of need, providing exceptional emotional and practical support and volunteering with other community organisations including Relay for Life, Monash Casey, and St John of God.



Young Citizen of the Year

Eliza Owen

Recognised for her exceptional dedication to community safety, Eliza Owen has been an inspiring young leader in the Hills region.

Eliza has served with both the Emerald SES and CFA, stepping up during major storms. She began supporting emergency logistics and welfare from a young age — even after her own home was destroyed during major storms.

By age 15, Eliza officially joined the SES, quickly becoming a trusted responder involved in storm response, flood recovery, landslide operations, community engagement and resilience-building initiatives.

Eliza holds the CFA Five-Year Service Award and continues to mentor and encourage other young volunteers in Emerald and Cockatoo.

Event of the Year

Emerald Arts Society's Annual Art Exhibition

Marking 55 years as a cornerstone of the local events calendar, the art exhibition showcases paintings, sculptures, drawings, and mixed media from emerging and established artists of all ages.

A dedicated committee from the Emerald Arts Society spends six months preparing for the show, which runs over the Cup Day long weekend at the Hills Hub in Emerald.

The much-loved exhibition celebrates creativity and community connection, showcasing over 200 artworks from across Victoria and interstate each year, and welcoming more than 400 visitors across its four-day program.

visitors for being a destination rich in scenery, history and activities for the whole family.

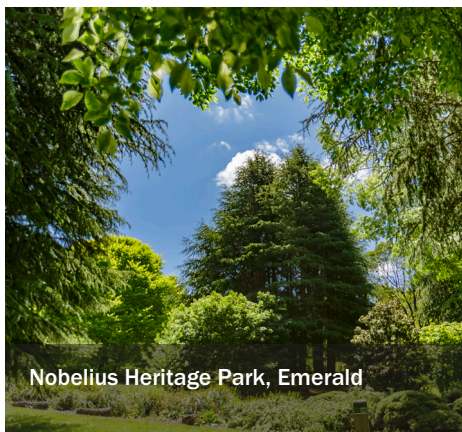

"Our activity calendar has been designed to help foster new connections and showcase our incredible open spaces," Cr Nickell said.

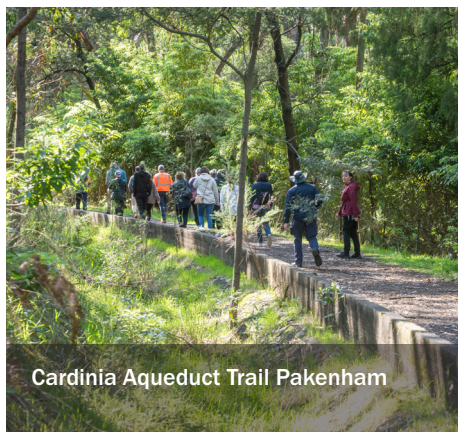

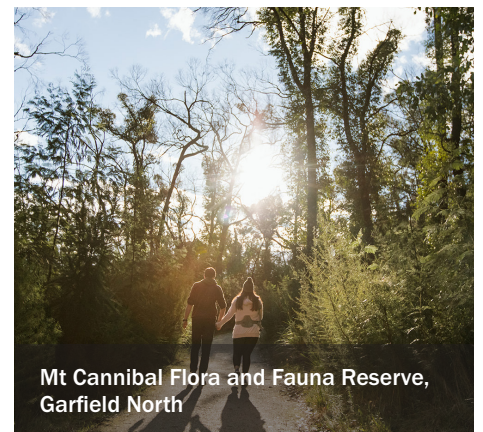

Pakenham Revitalisation Project

A new Gateway for Pakenham

We've been busy upgrading the Main Street Gateway precinct, as part of Stage 1 of the Pakenham Revitalisation project.

The Main Street Gateway precinct stretches from the Pakenham train line through to the Main Street roundabout and into Drake Place.

All Stage 1 works have been broken down into smaller phases to help minimise disruption and support local business.

Major construction is now complete in Drake Place near the roundabout, with final landscaping, lighting, seating, bins and pavement works expected to be completed in mid-2026.

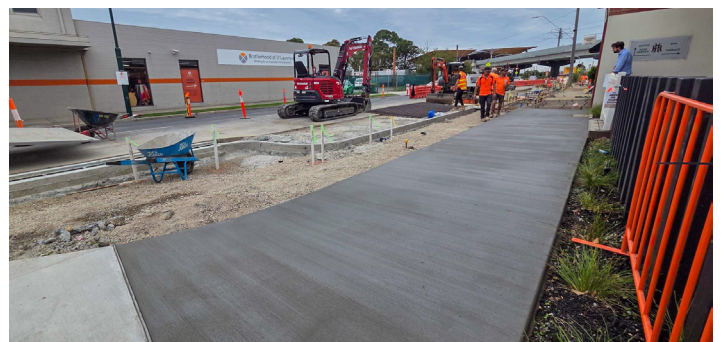
Works are currently underway along Main Street, stretching from the roundabout down towards the station.

Upgrades include:

- Pavement reconstruction and kerb upgrades.
- New accessible footpaths.
- Improved drainage.
- Lighting and landscaping.
- Street furniture installation including seating and bins.

The Main Street Gateway upgrades are the critical first step towards reimagining Pakenham's town centre, setting the scene for future stages and streetscape works.

Construction on the Main Street Gateway precinct is expected to be completed by mid-2026, conditions permitting.



Future plans unveiled

The Pakenham Revitalisation project is moving into its next exciting phase, with plans for the upcoming Stage 2 and 3 works being unveiled.

Stage 2 will include streetscape upgrades throughout Drake Place from the Railway Hotel to John Street, and Stage 3 works will take place along John Street from Drake Place towards the Main Street roundabout.

Cardinia Shire Mayor Councillor Brett Owen said the project was all about creating a safe, inviting space.

“This precinct connects directly into the town centre and the new Pakenham Community Hospital, so it’s important that people feel safe, supported and comfortable to get around.

“Our focus has been to improve accessibility and community safety within this precinct. We’re making this space more pedestrian-friendly by installing wider footpaths and new crossings, as well as additional lighting to improve visibility and community safety. We hope that these upgrades will make a real difference for locals, businesses and visitors alike.”

To transform this precinct into a safer, greener and more welcoming space for everyone, proposed upgrades include:

- New wide footpaths and safer pedestrian crossings.
- New road pavement and paving.
- Additional lighting and new power bollards.
- Drainage improvements and landscaping including mature shade trees and garden beds.
- More comfortable seating, benches and picnic tables.

Henty Ward Councillor and Deputy Mayor Councillor Liz Roberts said the works would help bring new life and activity into Pakenham’s town centre.

“We’re creating places that encourage people to stay, spend time and enjoy their surroundings.

“With more greenery, more seating and better lighting, this precinct will become a true community hub.

“We’re future proofing these spaces to improve visitation, the local economy and community safety, but also so

events, pop-ups, outdoor dining and community activities can be held right here in the heart of Pakenham.

“We’re working to create a connected, vibrant and accessible local centre for all people. A place where the community can shop, relax, gather and enjoy safe, welcoming public spaces.”

To minimise disruptions, Stage 2 and 3 works will be phased into smaller sections, and more information will be shared in the coming months.

Construction is anticipated to start around mid-2026, pending contractor availability.

Pakenham’s still open!

With construction underway, we are encouraging everyone to shop and support our local cafés, retailers and services. All businesses remain open, with signage and detours in place to help navigate the area.

Completed works

Several key projects have recently wrapped up:

- ✓ The Cardinia Life carpark has been resurfaced to ensure that the community can continue to safely access the popular centre.
- ✓ The public toilets at Cockatoo Little Athletics Club have been upgraded to improve convenience and accessibility for local sporting clubs and events.
- ✓ The Greenland Court Reserve playground in Garfield has been upgraded to create a safer, more welcoming and engaging space for all.
- ✓ Upgrades to the heating, ventilation and air-conditioning at Pakenham Hall and Emerald Library.
- ✓ The refreshed Lakeside Boulevard pedestrian crossing has made getting around the bustling Pakenham Lakeside precinct safer for all.
- ✓ The Mountain Road Recreation Reserve now boasts new sports ground lighting (pictured below).
- ✓ We've completed two more Sealing the Hills projects, sealing the Stoney Creek and Old Gembrook catchments to improve connectivity, reduce dust and enhance safety.





Rising tide of responsibility: Protecting the Biosphere

Cardinia Shire or Cardinia Shore? I bet you didn't know that the shire isn't just made up of rolling hills and bustling townships, we also have a coastline right on our doorstep...

Cardinia Shire forms part of the Western Port Biosphere Reserve, a UNESCO-recognised region and Ramsar-protected wetland of international importance, celebrated for its rich biodiversity and unique coastal habitats. This recognition means our coastline, ecosystems and wetlands are among the most environmentally significant places on the planet, valued globally for protecting nature while supporting local communities and everyday life.

The Western Port Biosphere Reserve is made up of five local government areas and the entirety of Western Port Bay, including the townships of Koo Wee Rup and Lang Lang. Mangroves, seagrass and saltmarsh thrive around these areas and support the natural ecosystems that help keep our waterways clean, protect the shoreline and support a wide range of marine life.

The Western Port Biosphere Reserve isn't just an environmental treasure; it benefits the community every day. The natural systems within the Biosphere help:

- Preserve biodiversity, supporting 65% of Victoria's bird species and more than 20,000 water birds.
- Provide places to relax, walk, kayak, and connect with nature, supporting mental and physical health.
- Support local agriculture, including dairy, beef, and vegetable growing.
- Absorb carbon and regulate climate, helping buffer the effects of a changing environment.

Council works in partnership with the Western Port Biosphere Foundation to protect Western Port and Councillor Samantha-Jane Potter represents council as part of the Western Port Biosphere Councillor Liaison Committee, helping guide local environmental priorities and championing regional cooperation.

"We work with the Western Port Biosphere Foundation and nearby councils to help protect these natural areas. Together, we support projects that restore mangroves, improve coastal resilience, and help local communities prepare for climate change and sea level rise," Cr Potter said.

"Western Port and its waterways are incredibly important but can be impacted by erosion, pollution and changes in water quality. That's why

Cardinia Shire supports regional plans aimed at protecting the bay's environment and improving the health of our creeks, wetlands and coastal areas."

Westernport Ward Cr Trudi Paton is a long-time advocate for the protection of our coastline.

"Protecting Western Port Bay starts with the people on the ground who care for the waterways that flow into it. Community action plays a critical role in reducing pollution and sediment that can disrupt this sensitive environment."

"We're incredibly fortunate to have dedicated, local volunteering groups, who work hard to keep the nasties out of our local waterways and protect the habitats that make this place so special. Looking after these waterways means protecting our coastline, farms, wildlife, and the future of our communities."

Let's TALK RUBBISH



Illegal dumping affects everyone in Cardinia Shire, and thanks to growing community awareness, we're already seeing real improvements in keeping our neighbourhoods clean and welcoming.

More than 100 new Dob in a Dumper signs have been added to 68 public place bins across the shire, helping residents understand the impacts of dumped rubbish and how to report it quickly and easily. With more people speaking up, Council is responding faster and restoring affected areas sooner.

A recent example on Haunted Gully Road in Officer shows the power of community action. When household waste was dumped, nearby residents immediately shared information

and footage, allowing Council to clean the area promptly and prevent further dumping.

In Pakenham East, increased awareness has also helped address soil dumping, with developers working closely with Council to clean up sites and stop repeat incidents.

Both reports led to prompt action and clean-up, as well as fines for those found responsible for illegally dumping rubbish.

The draft strategy is Council's long-term vision for waste management, recycling and resource recovery. It aligns with national and state requirements and aims to deliver sustainable, cost-effective services that meet local needs.

Calling for more time on new bin rollout

Council is delaying the rollout of glass only bins for all households, calling on the Victorian Government for more time, information and support for councils.

While reducing landfill remains a key focus of our draft Waste and Resource Recovery Strategy 2026–36, we don't believe a glass-only bin will help us achieve this goal.

Cardinia Shire Council has written to the Victorian Government to provide Service Standards that give councils certainty when planning services, and to share its business case for kerbside glass

recycling to help clarify the need for the service. Council has written to relevant Ministers, Members of Parliament and Mayors to outline concerns about the service's cost and inefficiency.

Council is part of a 36-council advocacy group led by the City of Maroondah which has commissioned independent research into the household and environmental impacts of a glass only service.

Introducing a glass only bin would cost around \$4 million for a typical council to implement and a further \$1.4 million

each year to operate. For the average Cardinia Shire household, this means paying an extra \$28 in charges per year.

Our current recycling system is working well, with less than 2 per cent of glass bottles and jars in the shire ending up in landfill, and 84 per cent of households putting out their fortnightly yellow-lid bin.

Council believes expanding the Victorian Government's Container Deposit Scheme to include wine and spirit bottles would achieve similar environmental benefits at a lower cost.

Be a good sort

Making sure you're sorting your rubbish and placing the right things in your bins helps keep valuable materials out of landfill and ensures they can be properly recycled or composted.

The top five contaminants in Cardinia Shire recycling bins are bagged recyclables (we can't get them out of bags), soft plastics, general rubbish, textiles and food waste.

None of these items should end up in your yellow lidded bin so 'be a good sort' and help us keep the recycling stream clean.

Don't fur-get to register your pet

As more households welcome furry companions, it's important we work together to make the shire a paw-sitive safe place for people and pets.

Whether you're a longtime resident or a new pet parent, we all have our part to play, including making sure your pets are registered with us. All cats and dogs over three months old must be registered.

Pet registration isn't just a formality – it's a commitment to your pet's safety,

your neighbours, and the wellbeing of the entire community.

Pet registrations must be renewed by 10 April each year. It takes only minutes, but the benefits last all year round.

Kindergarten registrations for 2027 are now open – so it's the perfect time to jump online and secure their place!


Council manages registrations for all community kindergartens across the shire, making the process simple, central and stress free. Families can register for both 3-year-old and 4-year-old kinder through our online portal.
