#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

To present the Quarterly Performance Report for the April to June 2016-17 period.

#### **BACKGROUND**

## Celebrating our volunteers

Councillors and staff gathered with community members at the Annual Mayoral Volunteer Reception in May to proudly recognise, support and value the contributions of volunteers in our shire. Coinciding with National Volunteer Week, the event acknowledged hundreds of volunteers across 560 organisations in the shire.

The event also announced this year's Stan Henwood Award recipient, Nar Nar Goon resident Ray Coombs. Now in his 70s, Ray is regarded by his community as a quiet achiever who has been supporting his community in one way or another for more than 50 years.

## Major projects

Council progressed and completed a number of major projects this quarter, delivering quality facilities for our community.

#### IYU Recreation Reserve - Stage 2

Completed in June, Stage 2 in the IYU Recreation Reserve project at Henry Road, Pakenham delivered the final parts in the development of a \$7.7m premier regional soccer facility. Jointly funded by Council, and the Victoria Government through Sport and Recreation Victoria and the Growing Suburbs Fund, the facility now includes a new pavilion, an all-weather synthetic soccer pitch and floodlighting. The reserve also includes an interactive public art piece (table tennis table), full-sized senior soccer field, multi-use pitch, playground, half-court basketball court, and gravel parking.

#### Deep Creek Reserve - Stage 1

Works started in June at the 48-hectare greenfield site on Cameron Way, Pakenham. They include preparing the site for construction, including weed removal, drain improvements, protection of native vegetation, and other earthworks.

### GENERAL COUNCIL MEETING - 21 AUGUST 2017



Jointly funded by an investment of \$7.5 million from Council's Capital Works Program over the next five years and a grant of \$2.825 million under the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund, this development will give Pakenham residents a refreshed community space with new paths, infrastructure, car park and Melbourne Water wetlands.

### Lang Lang Community and Recreation Precinct – Stage 1

In April, Stage 1 works started at the 36-hectare greenfield site located at the intersection of Soldiers and Caldermeade roads. Works include preparing the site for access, preliminary earth works, services, playing field construction, and lighting.

The \$11 million project, jointly funded by Lang Lang Community Bank Branch of Bendigo Bank and Council, has involved extensive community consultation including the formation of the Lang Lang Community Sporting Precinct Steering Committee. It will deliver new sports grounds and facilities, multipurpose community spaces, parks and other open spaces for recreational activities.

## Playground upgrades

Our playground upgrade programs provide improved play equipment and social areas suitable for children of all ages. As part of the development and design process, we work with the local community to ensure the upgrades meet community need and result in increased usage.

**Melissa Way Reserve, Pakenham** - Funded by Council's Playground Renewal Program 2016–17, the \$50,000 upgrade provided additional equipment for an all-ages play space, offering a range of new play experiences.

Rotary Park, Garfield Recreation Reserve - One of six projects in the \$900,000 annual program jointly funded by Council's Playground Renewal Program 2016–17 and the Victorian Government's Growing Suburbs Fund, the playground features two new play spaces and three picnic settings.

#### Effective partnerships

Council has been working closely with other levels of government, organisations and the community this quarter to deliver a number of partnership projects that benefit our community in a variety of ways.

Pakenham Health Centre – The centre officially opened in May after a collaborative redevelopment of the former municipal offices at Henty Way, Pakenham to provide accessible facilities that meet the needs of our growing community. Managed by Monash Health, the multi-agency integrated health centre offers residents approximately 35 services from one central location.

Community Leadership Program 2017 – This program, in its inaugural year, officially launched in June, and will be delivered throughout the 2017 calendar year. In a partnership between Council and Leadership Victoria, the new community leadership initiative provides targeted training for current and aspiring community leaders from a diverse range of backgrounds and interests across the shire.

Mr Yakkerboo meets Blue, Pakenham – Unveiled in time for this year's Yakkerboo Festival in May, the public artwork was commissioned under Council's annual Public Art Policy and now has pride of place in Pakenham's Main Street. The small bronze and steel sculptures, inspired and directed by artist Julie Squires, encouraged community participation, with local primary and secondary school students engaged to design and create Mr Yakkerboo's scales. The artwork celebrates Cardinia Shire's famous bunyip-style swamp character in a portrayal of Mr Yakkerboo meeting a blue heeler named 'Blue', creatively referencing the shire's pastoral history.

#### **Budget and Council Plan adopted**

### GENERAL COUNCIL MEETING - 21 AUGUST 2017



After community consultation, Council adopted the Budget, Council Plan and the Strategic Resource Plan for the 2017–18 financial year in May.

Since the Local Government election in 2016, Council has been developing a new Council Plan for the four-year term of this Council. The plan outlines Council's vision for Cardinia Shire to be developed in a planned manner, to enable present and future generations to live healthy and productive lives, and to enjoy the richness of the diverse and distinctive characteristics of the shire.

The adopted budget meets the lower 2 per cent rate environment and delivers more than \$44 million of capital works to the community. This has been achieved by continuing to focus on organisational efficiencies and savings through effective management of contracts and other sources of expenditure.

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## CEO's report - DRAFT

With the end of the 2016–17 financial year and the final quarter under the Council Plan 2013–17 approaching, Council remained committed to delivering results across the board, and here are some of the highlights.

## **Government interaction**

#### **Government Advocacy**

Council has been very busy this quarter advocating to various levels of government regarding a myriad of matters such as meeting with Planning for Victoria regarding road priorities across the shire including Lang Bypass, McGregor Road and Healesville Koo Wee Rup Road, meeting with the Department of Justice to discuss improving employment opportunities for Department of Justice offenders, meeting with Department of Education regarding Early Years management and meeting with various State Government Ministers.

In addition, Council staff met with representatives of the Department of Health and Human Services, Victoria Police, staff from the State Government's Office of Suburban Development, representatives of the Department of Environment Land Water and Planning, Department of Economic Development, Jobs, Transport and Resources, Victorian Planning Authority and Office for Suburban Development and Department of Education and Training regrading local issues

#### **Grant applications**

For the financial year Council has lodged 57 grant applications for a total of \$38,255,091 of which 27 applications have been successful for a total amount of \$16,814,787.

#### Legislative Program

It is anticipated that a draft of the new Local Government Act will be released by the State Government during the 2017 calendar year and Council will be providing constructive comment and feedback on the Bill. The rewrite of the 1989 Act is long overdue and should remove many of the anomalies in the legislation that has occurred over time due to many ad-hoc amendments being made to the legislation over the past 26 years.

During the quarter the State Taxation Acts Amendment Bill was introduced into State Parliament. This Bill amongst other matter proposed the centralisation of valuations by the Valuer General as well as requiring annual revaluations. This proposal was widely opposed by local government and it was pleasing to see that this part of the Bill was removed and a commitment given to consult with local government before proceeding with this proposal.

## **Major capital projects**

The following are the major projects currently underway to deliver improved transport and facilities in the Shire. These are projects that have a value over \$500,000.

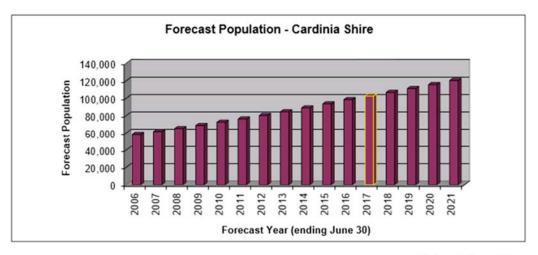

## **Cardinia Shire growth indicators**

Cardinia Shire is a growing community. This growth places demands on both our service and infrastructure provision. This section contains key indicators of growth that are combined with population projections to plan our activities.

Figure 1 illustrates that, in 2006, the total population of Cardinia Shire was estimated at 58,540 people. It is expected to experience an increase of over 62,200 people to 120,748 by 2021, at an average annual growth rate of 4.95 per cent per annum over 15 years.

## **Property**

#### Subdivisions - residential lots

Residential lots data is a lead indicator and highlights residential development activity that drives much of the growth in demand for council's services and facilities. Residential Applications have increased this quarter but have slowed down considerably this financial year. In contrast, Statement of Compliance figures for the year are at a record 4 year high.

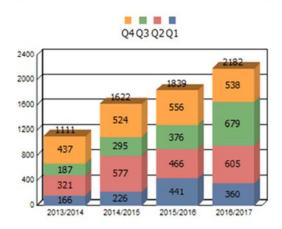
Figure 2 illustrates that there were 44 lots in application for the certification of plans of subdivision this quarter. Results are 134% higher than the previous quarter. Applications are 37% lower than the same time last year.

Figure 3 illustrates that there were 538 lots for which a statement of compliance was issued this quarter allowing for the sale and development of individual lots. Results are 21% lower than the previous quarter and 19% higher than the same time last year. YTD results are at record four year high.

## Planning applications

Figure 4 highlights the level of development activity in relation to applications for planning permits. There were 227 planning applications this quarter, 21% higher than the previous quarter. The year to date figure is 2% lower than the same time last year.

## **Building permits**

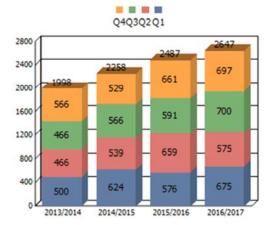


Figure 5. Total building permits issued

Building permits are required for both new buildings and alterations to existing buildings. Figure 5 to 7 highlight the level of development activity in relation to building permits and building completions for both residential and non-residential buildings.

Figure 5 illustrates that there were 697 building permits issued this quarter. That figure is on par with last quarter and 6% higher than the same time last year. YTD results are at record four year high.

Figure 6 illustrates that there were 337 residential building completions this quarter. That is an increase of 7% from the previous quarter but 4% higher than the same time last year.

Figure 6. Residential building completions

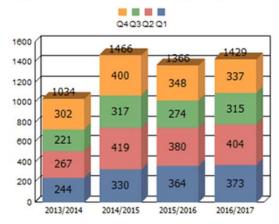
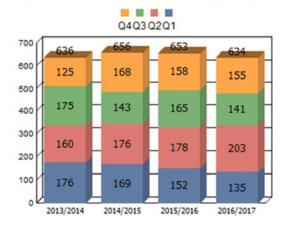


Figure 7 illustrates that there were 155 non-residential building completions this quarter. That is an increase of 10% from the previous quarter but 3% lower than the same time last year.

## Residential land development indicators

These indicators combine the residential growth pipeline on the one trend graph. A five-quarter rolling average is used to smooth out the peaks and troughs within the quarterly data and to recognise emerging trends.

The data in Figure 8 is based on the quarter on quarter information beginning from the July quarter 2011-12.

The average number of **lots submitted for subdivision** reached a record low in the 2nd quarter of 2012-13 with 282 lots. Numbers peaked have peaked in the first quarter of each year for the last 4 years. The first quarter of 2016-17 peaked at an average of 712 lots submitted for subdivision. The current average number of lots has dropped to 491 but are expected to increase again as the Officer Precinct development progresses.

The average number of **new lots released** onto the market has been steadily increasing since the 1st quarter of 2013-14. Numbers have increased this month with an average of 538 lots released. The average number of **dwelling completions** is 337 and is levelling. This is a lag indicator and is expected to rise within 6 to 12 months as land development progresses.

#### Land information certificates

Land Information Certificates are required whenever a property changes owners. This figure includes both first home buyers and subsequent owners. It shows both growth and churn in the property market.

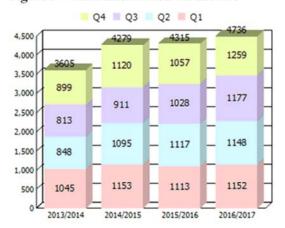


Figure 9. Land information certificates

Figure 9 illustrates that there were 1259 certificates issued this quarter, 7% higher than the previous quarter. Year to date results are 10% higher than the same time last year, an indication of a growing property market.

#### Household garbage service

A new household garbage service is requested predominantly when a new home has been completed and ready to be occupied. This indicator can therefore represent the growth of new households within the Shire.

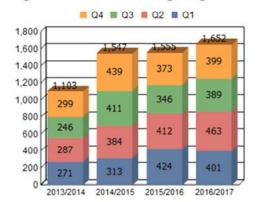


Figure 10. New household garbage service volumes

Figure 10 illustrates that there were 399 new bins requested this quarter, 3% higher than last quarter. The year to date total is on 6% higher than last year, indicating a rise of new households.

The daily average of new households established within the Shire remains at four families per calendar day for the quarter. The year to date growth indicator remains at **five** new families per calendar day.

## Roads and footpaths

#### Sealed roads

The sealed road network is currently 670 km in length. Sealed road growth is due to a combination of subdivision development and Councils sealing of unsealed roads through special charge schemes or other external funding such as roads to recovery. The road maintenance program is conducted in accordance with councils Road Management Plan and is supplemented by cyclic maintenance programs including annual road resealing and rehabilitation.

Figure 11 illustrates that there was an additional 4.50km of sealed roads constructed this quarter, 33% lower than the previous quarter. The year to date total is 5% lower than at the same time last year.

#### **Footpaths**

Footpaths are an important means of improving community cohesion by providing for pedestrian traffic around our communities. The footpath network is currently 642 km in length, with an average growth rate of 33 km per year. This growth is due to a combination of footpaths constructed from subdivision development and Council's capital works program.

Figure 12 illustrates that there was 8.4km of footpaths constructed this quarter, 34% lower than the previous last quarter. The year to date total is 10% higher than at the same time last year.

## **Customer responsiveness**

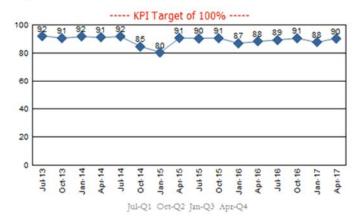
This section shows performance in relation to two fundamental areas of responsiveness: - actioning inwards correspondence, (mail, fax, email) and actioning service requests.

## Inwards correspondence - (Mail, fax, email)

KPI target: 100 per cent of inwards correspondence requiring action, to be acknowledged within 10 days.

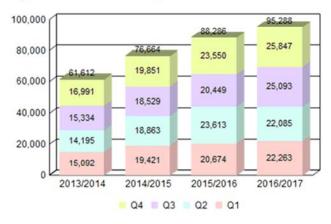
An Action Referral is an item of inwards correspondence received via mail, fax or email, requiring a response. Figure 13 illustrates that an average of 90% of Action Referrals this quarter were acknowledged within 10 days, 2% higher than the previous quarter. Performance reports are distributed to all managers on a fortnightly basis and this is contributing to a higher level of consistency in relation to actioning correspondence.

The volume of inwards correspondence is expected to increase, relative to our population growth and as Council's services are expanded and enhanced to meet the growing needs of our community. Figure 14 illustrates that there were 25,847 action referrals this quarter, 3% higher than the previous quarter. The year to date total is 8% higher than the same time last year and trending upwards.

#### Service requests

## KPI target: 90 per cent service requests finalised in time.

Figure 15 indicates that the KPI target of 90% is close to being achieved in all periods. 88% of service requests were finalised in time for the quarter, 2% higher than the previous quarter.

Figure 15. Service request in time: KPI per cent by quarter

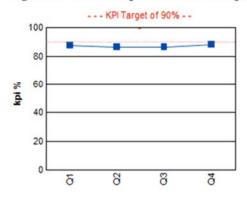
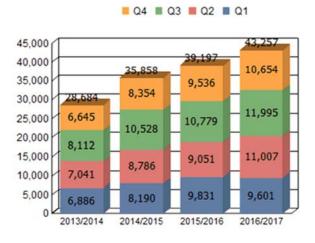


Figure 16 illustrates that there were 10,654 service requests this quarter, 11% lower than the previous quarter. The year to date total is 10% higher than the same time last year, indicating an upwards trend in requests.

## Sustainable service

The sustainable service indicator set provides a variety of volume type indicators relating to a core service delivery to the community. These are not an exhaustive set, but have been chosen to reflect some of the breadth of council's obligations.

#### Unsealed roads and surface drains

In addition to the sealed road network, council maintains a large unsealed road network which is 873 km in length with an annual maintenance budget of in excess of \$3.3 million. Maintenance works consist of both grading and resheeting done on a cyclic basis along with response to defects caused by adverse weather conditions such as storms or long dry spells. All works are conducted in accordance with council's road management plan which ensures that the network

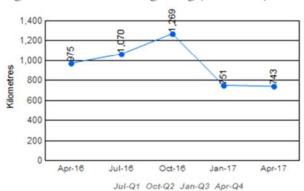


Figure 17. Unsealed road grading (kilometres)

Figure 17 illustrates at there were 743 km of unsealed road grading this quarter, 1% lower than last quarter. Quarter 2 figure is higher as a number of the roads required less concentrated works to maintain, meaning greater lengths of road were able to be graded.

Figure 18 illustrates at there were 18,228 tonnes of unsealed road resheeting this quarter, 21% lower than last quarter. The volume of crushed rock placed on Councils unsealed network reduces over the drier months of the year, as the focus is on delivering water to roads to aid compaction. The plant used to deliver crushed rock are reconfigured into water carts during this period.

Council also maintains over 2000 km of open surface drains. These drains are cleaned out using a maintenance system which is driven by proactive inspections and reactive works, and supplemented by responding to flooding issues following storms. Works are undertaken on a priority basis based on risk to property or person.

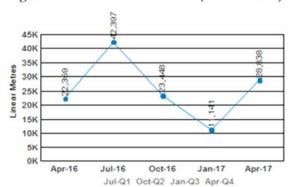


Figure 19. Surface drains cleared (linear metres)

Figure 19 illustrates at there was 28,838 linear metres of surface drains cleared this quarter,159% higher than last quarter. The increase in the linear metres of surface drains cleared in September 2016 is due to the use of a tractor mounted rotary drainer. This machine is able to complete vast distances in a short time frame compared to other types of machines used by Council. However it has limitations in its ability to clean certain types of drains and is also restricted to the wetter months of the year.

### Community

#### Maternal and Child Health (MCH)

The Maternal Child Health Service is a State Government and Council funded service for families who have children aged birth to school age. The service provides support to parents, offering information and advice on issues related to child health and development, parenting, maternal health and wellbeing as well as providing groups for first time mothers.

Birth notices are the number of notifications received from hospitals of newborn babies in the municipality. Figure 20 illustrates that there were 412 birth notices this quarter, 6% lower than the previous quarter. YTD figures are 3% higher than last year.

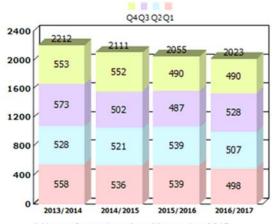


Figure 21. Maternal and Child Health new enrolments

Total enrolments are the number of babies and children zero to school age that visit and enrol at a MCH centre, including both new births and children of families moving to Cardinia Shire. Figure 21 illustrates that there were 490 enrolments this quarter, 7% lower than last quarter. YTD figures are 2% lower than last year.

#### Number of youth interactions

Cardinia Shire Council Youth Services provides a range of activities, programs and services for young people aged 12 to 25 years that reside in or have a strong connection to the municipality. Services are provided from My Place Youth Facility, in schools and community venues across the Shire.

People have been access services and programs from My Place since January 2013. My Place is Council's youth facility where young people, parents and professionals can access information and advice on a range of topics including health and wellbeing, education and training, drugs and alcohol.

My Place represents not only Council Youth Services programs but other service provider programs and services as well. The Mobile Youth Bus (MYBus) was introduced as a service in June 2009 and decommissioned from October 2015 with a new model of Youth Outreach implemented.

The number of contacts with young people initially decreased as a result of the change which has included the delivery of targeted programs and activities which meet school, youth and community needs. Lunch time visits attracted large numbers of young people through the service. The number of contacts with young people has steadily increased during 2016/2017 with the inclusion of Communities that Care and an increase of .4EFT funded by VicHealth to increase support to young people who identify as GLBTI. Young people have hosted number of events within local secondary schools to celebrate diversity and inclusion. Youth Services have also had an increase of services outreaching from My Place and an influx of referrals to the Youth Support Program (43 young people supported by this program in the last quarter)

Figure 22 illustrates the number of contacts with young people over a 4 year period. The chart reflects the total cumulative number of young people (not individuals) that participated in activities, programs and services. This quarter there were 6,999 contacts with young people. Results are 24% lower than the previous quarter but YTD figures are 23% higher than the same time last year.

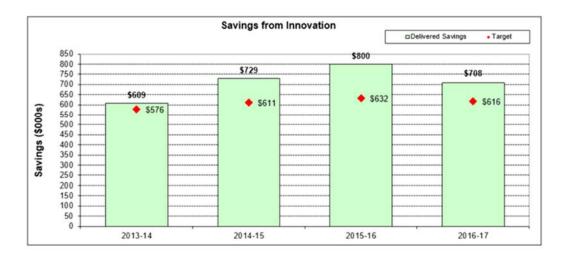

## **Business innovation**

A key element in ensuring the sustainability of our service delivery is continuing to strive for the best utilisation of resources in delivering those services. One way we measure this is by quantifying the innovation or improvement in how we do things. We measure this in terms of the number of initiatives, and the savings (direct or opportunity) those initiatives realise.

We currently have a target of delivering 2 per cent of our salary budget in savings each year. Our target in 2016–17 for improvements is to deliver a minimum of \$616,000 in savings. There are currently 55 improvement projects that have been identified which have delivered savings of \$708,070, which is 115% of the target.

Figure 23. Business improvements



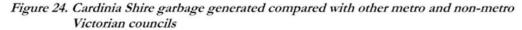
## Waste management

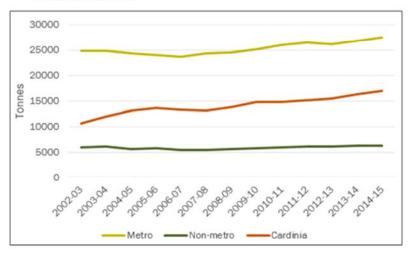
Indicators in this section relate to our behaviour with waste disposal and resource recovery. That is, how much waste we send to landfill and how much is recycled or composted. These figures are monitored on a monthly basis.

#### Waste trends

Waste generated in Cardinia Shire is in line with expectations from a shire of its size, population and interface location, and can inform opportunities for services, education and advocacy in the future.

Figure 24 illustrates amount of garbage generated in comparison to other councils. As the shire's population continues to grow, the amount of waste generated is also growing. As areas of the shire become more urbanised (similar to metro areas) the tonnages collected will increase to be more in line with metro councils. This means Council will be handling more garbage in the future based on current trends

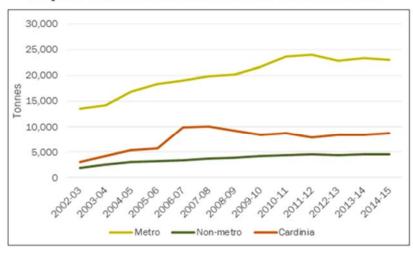


Figure 25. Cardinia Shire recyclables (recycling and green waste streams) generated compared with other metro and non-metro Victorian councils.

Figure 25 illustrates the amount of recyclable material generated (recycling and green waste streams) in comparison to other councils. Similar to the trend for amount of total waste generation is the amount of recyclable material generated, with spikes in data occurring in 2006 with the introduction of the green waste bin. Presumably the green waste bin introduction prompted properties to clear green waste which may have been stock piled and levelled off in more recent years. Moisture content in green waste from wet or dry years can vary the tonnage of recycling, with the drought experienced in some years can also have an impact.

## **Garbage to landfill**

With urban population growth it's expected that the amount of garbage to landfill may increase similar to that of metro Council areas. Increases are also attributed to the lack of new regional facilities and technologies to process and divert some wastes that are currently entering landfill.

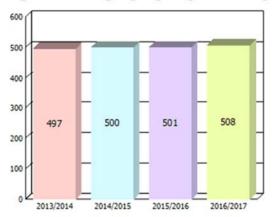


Figure 26. Average kg of garbage to landfill per household per year

Figure 26 illustrates that the average volume of garbage to landfill per household is 508kg to date this financial year. This is an increased from last year's annual average of 501 kg.

#### **Kerbside collection**

Figure 27 illustrates that there were 4,629 tonnes of garbage waste to landfill collection this quarter, 3% lower than last quarter. The YTD figure is 3% higher than last year. The tonnes collected are expected to increase due to population growth within the Shire.

Figure 28 illustrates that there were 2,369 tonnes of recycle waste collection this quarter, 6% lower than last quarter, the YTD figure is 4% higher than last year.

Figure 28. Recycle waste - tonnes collected

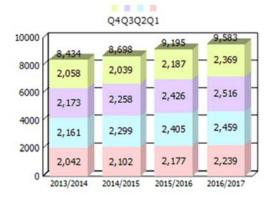
